

Evgenia has brought her unique perspective to films such as Heartless by Nara Normande and Tião, Machtat by Sonia Benslama, and Mi Iubita Mon Amour by Noémie Merlant.

With each project, Alexandrova seeks to explore fresh possibilities: "I don't want to be recognized for doing the same thing every time; I hope people see a strong sense of proposition in my work."



Evgenia Alexandrova is diving into several dynamic projects as she continues to expand her horizons. These include a fiction feature and a hybrid documentary-fiction project.

"Each project is an invitation to connect with new stories, new people, and new ways of seeing the world," she says, embodying her tireless curiosity and artistic courage.

As she moves forward, Alexandrova remains committed to creating narratives that resonate deeply while pushing the boundaries of visual storytelling.



Alexandrova's inspirations extend beyond the visual medium, drawing from literature, culture, and her personal experiences.

Her favorite works include Twin Peaks, which she describes as deeply touching her subconscious, The Zone of Interest for its powerful yet subtle cinematography, and Toni Erdmann, a film that seamlessly integrates metaphor and storytelling.

"What moves me most isn't just the cinematography but how the story is told—how images serve the narrative," she explains.

Her broad artistic influences and multidisciplinary approach are evident in her work, from her graduation film documenting the Arctic island of Svalbard to her experimental color work in The Balconettes.


IMMERSE YOURSELF IN FILMMAKING PRACTICE

VENICE 2's Rialto Mini System Introduced in Turkey for the First Time through a GYD and Sony Collaboration

On June 18th, a special event was held at Istanbul Kemer Studios through the collaboration of the Cinematographers' Association of Turkey (GYD) and Sony, where the Rialto Mini extension system developed for the VENICE 2 cinema camera was introduced in Turkey for the very first time.

The event served as a significant gathering for local cinematographers.

Attendees had the opportunity to experience firsthand the compact design and flexible usability of the Rialto Mini. Designed to simplify operation in tight spaces and complex rig setups, the system offers creative solutions without compromising the image quality or technical capabilities of the VENICE 2.



During the event, cinematographer Doğan Sarıgüzel, representing GYD, shared his impressions from test shoots conducted using the Rialto Mini.

Daniel Listh, Sony Cinema Business Development Manager, presented the technical aspects of the system and offered an in-depth look at how it is applied in real-world production environments.



At the conclusion of the event, participants were invited to explore the Mini Rialto system hands-on and engage in discussions about its potential use in upcoming projects. This gathering encouraged the exchange of knowledge around emerging film technologies and helped strengthen professional ties within the cinematography community.

Vincenzo Carpineta at Le Giornate della Luce – Spilimbergo

Vincenzo Carpineta, AIC, was a special guest at the 11th Edition of Le Giornate della Luce – Spilimbergo, Italy's most prominent festival dedicated exclusively to cinematographers. He was joined by director Maurizio Nichetti, with the event moderated by director Gloria De Antoni. The meeting took place on June 7th, during the screening of Amichemai, which officially opened this year's festival.



"Le giornate della luce – Spilimbergo is the only Italian Festival dedicated to Cinematic Photography. I thank all the organizers, starting with Gloria De Antoni, for the warm welcome they gave us. It was a pleasure for me to open this 11th edition with the film Amichemai by Maurizio Nichetti, in the presence of a large and engaged audience. The film, which marks Nichetti's return to directing a feature film after more than twenty years, develops across three different contemporary narrative levels. We tried to distinguish these levels using different formats and photographic tones. The result was that stories set in the same environments with the same characters seemed to belong to different worlds. I believe this helps us understand how cinematography can influence the atmosphere of a film!"




The inaugural ceremony took place on June 14, 2025, honouring outstanding achievements in categories such as Best Acting, Best Directing, and Best Cinematography.

Cooke is attending the European Lens Summit 2025

The New Collaborations that Empower the Cinematographer's Vision


On Saturday and Sunday evening (16:30 – 17:30), Cooke Digital will host a seminar taking place on the main stage at CVP Brentford.

In Memoriam: Ron Johanson OAM ACS (1949-2025)
Former IMAGO Co-President and Cinematography Legend



It is with profound sadness that IMAGO – International Federation of Cinematographers mourns the passing of Ron Johanson OAM ACS, former IMAGO Co-President and a legendary figure in the Australian and international cinematography communities.

Ron Johanson brought wisdom, humor, and quiet strength to every role he undertook. He served as IMAGO Interim Chair in 2020, succeeding Kees Van Oostrum ASC NSC SBC AIC, and was elected as co-president in 2021. His contributions to IMAGO throughout the years proved invaluable.

Born in Melbourne on September 3, 1949. His natural talent quickly propelled him through the ranks to become a respected Director of Photography.

Ron's extensive career spanned over five decades, during which he shot and directed hundreds of television commercials, music videos, and documentaries. His feature film credits include serving as Director of Photography on Scott Hicks' debut feature Freedom (1982), The Mango Tree (1977), and Cut (2000).

His contributions to the craft and the community were recognized with ACS Accreditation in 1992, induction into the ACS Hall of Fame in 2005, Life Membership in 2007, and the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in 2014 for his services to the film industry and mentoring. He also received the Byron Kennedy Award (as ACS President), the Kodak Award, and the Ron Windon ACS Contribution Award.

But beyond titles and accolades, Ron will be remembered for his generosity, warmth, and fierce loyalty. He mentored generations of cinematographers, many of whom have gone on to acclaimed careers, and brought people together with his infectious energy and a wicked sense of humor.

Ron Johanson's legacy is vast – not only in the images he helped create, but in the people he inspired, the institutions he built, and the spirit of generosity and camaraderie he embodied.

Our thoughts are with Ron's beloved family and friends during this difficult time.

Rest in peace, dear Ron. You will be deeply missed.



In Memoriam: Ron Johanson OAM ACS (1949-2025)
Former IMAGO Co-President and Cinematography Legend



It is with great sorrow that the IMAGO Diversity and Inclusion Committee acknowledges the passing of our beloved member Ronald Geoffrey Johanson OAM ACS.

Ron was a true champion of inclusivity. As a leader, he strove to make the ACS and IMAGO more welcoming to all and to implement changes to improve both organisations. Ron served as National ACS president for fourteen years from 2008 to 2022, becoming only the second ACS president to serve as the Australian representative in IMAGO, subsequently serving as a Board Member, and eventually becoming a co-president in 2021. It was during the period that he served as IMAGO Board Member and IMAGO co-president that IMAGO became truly international, growing from its roots as an European organisation into one that represents the global family of cinematographers.

His passing is a great loss to us all. Ron supported the creation of the Imago D&I committee instantly and unequivocally. He was warm, intelligent, inspiring and most importantly full of integrity and great fun to work with. He used his empathy, care and concern for others in Board meetings, festivals and events, to work tirelessly to bring international collaboration between cinematographers for the good of all.

We were so fortunate to know and work with him. He will be very missed.
