
Through their dedication to indie filmmaking they developed their skills during the digital transformation of the industry.

Their meticulous preparation combined with storytelling sensitivity enables them to bring life to various projects which include black-and-white Chinese art films and extensive international TV shows that span multiple countries.

Xiaosu Han AAC (Xax) and Andreas Thalhammer AAC have established themselves as leading cinematographers who use their expertise to transform visual storytelling in the film industry.

Their filmmaking journey started with independent projects which evolved into international work as they developed a flexible approach that unites preparation with innovative techniques.

Their ability to customize visual elements according to story requirements makes them stand out as they work on Viennese period dramas and sci-fi thrillers. The directors' vision receives life through our work according to Xax and Andreas who repeat this principle for every production they undertake.



Xax and Andreas maintain their creative edge through their methodical planning approach and their perfect teamwork which enables them to introduce new ideas while maintaining absolute reliability throughout production.

Xiaosu Han and Andreas Thalhammer currently work on multiple projects which span different creative directions. The duo maintains their creative growth through their ongoing work on television shows and feature films and their initial attempt at writing an original screenplay. After dozens of projects together, their collaborative storytelling journey has only started while they maintain a forward-thinking perspective.


Xax and Andreas draw their visual storytelling inspiration from various influential works which include:

Fight Club, David Fincher (1999): A benchmark of visual precision and dark, layered narratives.

Hero, Zhang Yimou (2002): A stunning display of vibrant cinematography that perfectly supports storytelling.

1917, Roger Deakins (2019): An example of how visuals can serve the story without overshadowing it.

Their aesthetic changes with each new project but they maintain that storytelling remains the core focus because they seek to enhance the narrative through visual elements.

A New Era in Cinematography: FUJIFILM GFX ETERNA 55

The Cinematographers' Association of Turkey (GYD) & Fujifilm hosted on September 30th the launch event of Fujifilm's medium-format cinema camera, GFX ETERNA 55, developed specifically for the motion picture industry.

The event welcomed around 70 attendees, bringing together members of GYD along with leading cinematographers, post-production professionals, and industry representatives.

Participants had the opportunity to explore the latest innovations in cinema technology.



Following the reception, the session — moderated by our member Doğan Sarıgüzel (GYD) — featured a special screening of the GFX ETERNA 55 commercial film, directed by Ahmet Sesigürgil (GYD).

After the screening, Sesigürgil shared detailed insights into the filming process and his creative experience with the camera, answering questions from the audience. The discussion provided a first-hand look at the camera's performance under professional production conditions.



In the later part of the event, participants had the chance to take a closer look at the GFX ETERNA 55 and test its features. During the technical presentation, Fujifilm specialists shared in-depth information about the camera's innovative sensor design, color reproduction technology, and ergonomic structure.

The cinematic concept formed together with the story. We were heading mostly linearly, and tried to shape the form of photography to the mood and action of the scenes.



COMMITTEE NEWS & IMAGO BALKAN CONFERENCE 2025 - REPORT

The traditional IMAGO Balkan Conference was held for the 14th time during the MANAKI BROTHERS International Film Festival on September 23rd at Pionerski Dom in Bitola, North Macedonia. The Balkan Conference was established by former IMAGO President Nigel Walters, BSC, to foster connection and exchange among Balkan cinematographers.

This year's conference had 19 participants who live and work in eight different Balkan countries.



The conference was opened by Bojana Andric, SAS, IMAGO Co-Vice President, who welcomed participants and invited them to share news and updates from their countries.

The main focus of the first part of the conference was the topic of working conditions, as participants, for several years in a row, have witnessed many different and difficult practices in their countries. Each country has its own typical working conditions, written or unwritten, mostly around 72 hours per week, six days per week, which is above national law in most countries. Union representation is weak or lacking in many countries, and even where present, it offers limited support to cinematographers.

During the 2024 Balkan Conference, participants drafted the Manaki Manifesto to be shared with national societies, which, after signing, would start a dialogue about improving working conditions.



In the second part of the conference, Astrid Heubrandtner, AAC and IMAGO Working Conditions Committee member, exclusively shared with participants a first glimpse of the initial draft of the extensive IMAGO WCC Survey Results Study, "BEHIND THE LENS", which will soon be published and presented in the EU Parliament.

The results show trends across Europe and were collected during 2024. All participants agreed that it would be very important for the final published study to be shared with all national societies and, if possible, translated into national languages.

In the third part of the conference, as part of IMAGO's participation in the international discussion on AI in cinematography, Dr. Cristina Busch, IP lawyer and member of the IMAGO Authorship Committee, contributed with a presentation titled "Al and the Future of Filmmaking – Exploring Al's Impact on Creativity, Ownership and Fair Remuneration."

Her talk addressed the pressing need for a coherent policy response to the legal uncertainties introduced by AI-assisted creation in cinematography.

The presentation examined the legal implications of Al-generated and Al-assisted content, focusing on authorship attribution, copyright protection, and fair remuneration. Dr. Busch outlined the current shortcomings in intellectual property law for works involving both human and machine contributions. She emphasized the need for clear legal definitions and coordinated European policy to safeguard cinematographers' creative and economic rights in an Al-driven production environment. This intervention reflects the Authorship Committee's ongoing commitment to shaping future-proof authorship and copyright frameworks for the film industry.



After a 40-minute presentation and Q&A, the main question arose - whether cinematographers will even need to discuss working conditions if AI replaces their jobs.

To quote Dr. Busch: "Intellectual property rights are undergoing significant changes. If copyright protection is being considered for Al-generated works, then it's even more critical to ensure that cinematographers - whose creative input defines the visual language of cinema - are properly recognized and protected. This isn't just about legal rights; it's about preserving the human essence and artistic soul of cinema."

The final part of the conference was dedicated to a discussion about the Manaki Manifesto text and its signing by the national societies.

MANAKI MANIFESTO

To Our Fellow Cinema and TV Community of the Balkan Countries,

We, the cinematographer's associations of the Balkan countries, unite in solidarity to address a critical issue affecting our industry: the prolonged and often excessive working hours endured by our members. It is with great concern and determination that we raise our voices against this practice, which we deem unacceptable and detrimental to the well-being of our colleagues and the quality of our work.

Across the Balkans, cinematographers, camera operators, lighting technicians, and all those involved in the production of cinema and television face relentless schedules, often working well beyond reasonable limits. The demanding nature of our craft should not serve as justification for the exploitation of our time and energy. Long hours not only compromise our physical health and mental well-being but also impair our creative abilities, leading to diminished artistic output and substandard productions.

As representatives of our respective associations, we declare our unwavering commitment to advocating for fair and humane working conditions for all workers in our industry. We firmly believe that every individual involved in the creation of film and television deserves to work in an environment that respects their rights, values their contributions, and prioritizes their safety and welfare above all else.

Furthermore, we recognize the power of solidarity in effecting meaningful change. By joining forces across borders, we strengthen our collective voice and amplify our impact. We stand in solidarity with our fellow cinematographers and set workers throughout the Balkans, affirming our shared struggle and determination to create a better, more equitable future for all.

Therefore, we call upon producers, directors, and stakeholders within the industry to acknowledge the importance of this issue and to work collaboratively with us to implement policies that ensure reasonable working hours, adequate rest periods, and fair compensation for overtime. We urge governments and regulatory bodies to enforce existing labor laws and to enact new measures where necessary to protect the rights and well-being of workers in the film and television sector.


